**Minutes of 4th Meeting of State Level Advisory Committee constituted under Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 held at 1130 Hrs on 08.05.2019.**

The 4<sup>th</sup> meeting of State Level Advisory Committee (SLAC) of Haryana constituted under the Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 was held under the Chairmanship of Sh. Rajeev Arora, IAS, Additional Chief Secretary to Government of Haryana, Health Department at 1130 Hrs on 08.05.2019 at Conference Room of State Institute of Health & Family Welfare (SIHFV), Sector-6 Panchkula. The list of participants is enclosed at **Annexure-A**.

Chairman welcomed all the participants and Member Secretary, Haryana State Pollution Control Board (HSPCB) briefly explained the agenda items for discussion in the meeting. The proceedings of the meeting and decisions taken along are as below.

**Agenda Item No. 1: Confirmation of the minutes of previous meeting.**

The minutes of the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting of SLAC held on 26.03.2019, which were circulated on 04.04.2019 to all the members, were confirmed.

**Agenda Item No. 2: Review of actions taken on the decisions of the previous meeting.**

The important decisions taken during the earlier meeting include finalization of recommendations by the Sub-Committee constituted by SLAC for recommending the waste treatment charges to be charged by Common Bio Medical Waste Treatment Facilities (CBWTFs) from Health Care Facilities (HCFs) in a uniform manner following transparent and uniform procedure. The Sub-Committee was also directed to consider re-distribution of HCFs among CBWTFs. This item was kept as a separate agenda (item no. 3) and dealt with accordingly.

The compliance status of Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 in selected cities / towns/ Panchayats of Haryana, as per the directions of Hon'ble NGT in its order dated 06.03.2019 in OA No. 606/2018 in the matter of 'Compliance of Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016' and as per the commitment given by Chief Secretary in the Hon'ble Tribunal, were to be submitted by the stakeholders in the present meeting. The matter was discussed at length under another specific agenda (item no. 5) separately.

Agenda Item No. 3: Report of Sub-Committee constituted by SLAC

The Sub-Committee constituted by SLAC for recommending the treatment charges of Bio Medical Waste of different categories of HCFs by CBWTFs and re-distribution of HCFs among CBWTFs was submitted to the SLAC for its consideration and discussion. The Committee went through the report of the Sub-Committee (Annexure-B) carefully and the existing rates being charged by CBWTFs, proposed rates given by the CBWTF Association and recommendations of Sub-Committee on treatment charges for different categories of HCFs.

- Representatives of IMA raised his demand for exclusion of non-bedded clinics with the category of HCFs upto 5 beds and charging uniform rate of Rs. 1000/- per month. He wanted that the rates prescribed for non-bedded category be reduced further. It was discussed and the sub-committee informed the rationale behind the inclusion (that facilities upto 5 beds usually generate much lesser waste, on par with non-bedded clinics and that they must be included in the same category). The representative of CBWTFs demanded that the rates should be exclusive of the rates of disposal bags, which, they wanted to be in addition to the proposed rates. This was discussed at length by the Committee and the demand was not accepted after learning the exercise done by sub-committee before fixing up the same.
- CBWTF representative also wanted that all facilities with more than 20 beds may be charged on per bed basis as has been proposed presently for facilities with more than 50 beds. However, this was not agreed upon by the Committee, considering the demand of IMA to include at least this minimum strata / categories for reducing the burden of hospitals with lesser beds.
- Director, Animal Husbandry & Dairying Department requested that the rates for individual hospital unit may be fixed at Rs. 1100/- per month (against the proposed amount of Rs. 1500/- per month) considering the less amount of waste generated in the veterinary hospital units. This was agreed to by the Committee, after discussion.
- CBWTF representative requested that the fixed additional amount of Rs. 4000/- per PHC/CHC which are established outside the municipal limits of District Headquarters, in consideration of the distance factor involved in collection of waste from the HCFs may be increased to Rs. 5000/- per month considering the increased transportation charges. This demand was considered and agreed by the Committee after discussion.

The issue relating to redistribution of HCFs among CBWTFs as per the recommendations of sub-committee was discussed and the representative of CBWTF informed that all the CBWTFs have unanimously decided to not to reallocate or redistribute the existing HCFs as proposed by sub-committee, and they are satisfied with the present status. After learning the assurance from CBWTF Association Representative, it was decided by SLAC to allow the CBWTFs to continue with the existing allocations, as such.

As indicated earlier, the Committee further agreed for increasing the fixed additional amount of Rs. 4000/- per facility per month (in case of PHC/CHC which are established outside the municipal limits of District Headquarters) to Rs. 5000/- per facility per month, as requested by CBWTF Association. The Committee also agreed to the demand of CBWTF Association to allow them to charge an additional amount of Rs. 30/- per kg, from the HCFs with more than 50 beds, if they generate more than 325 gms of waste per day per bed.

- CBWTF representative further requested that the charges proposed per bed per day may be increased from Rs. 7/- to Rs. 8/- and in case of facilities with more than 50 beds, an additional charge of Rs. 30/- per kg may be allowed to be charged if the facilities are generating more than 325 gms of waste per bed per day. This was also accepted by the Committee after a brief discussion on the matter with all the Members. Subsequently, upon careful consideration of all the above points, the Committee decided to finalize the following rates for implementation by all CBWTFs to be charged from HCFs.

**Agenda Item No. 4: Status of compliance of Bar Coding System**

The Committee was apprised on the status of compliance of Bar Coding System by CBWTFs and HCFs. While it was observed that all the CBWTFs have started adopting the Bar Coding System, it was also noted that there is a huge gap in the part of HCFs in complying with the same. Many of the HCFs in the State are still in the process of adopting the Bar Code System. After examining the progress made, the Committee decided that all CBWTFs shall link up all their HCFs in their network and start providing data on quantity of waste lifted from individual HCF and receipt at CBWTFs through remote means and a dashboard shall also be set up for continuous monitoring of the same by HSPCB. It was further decided that no HCF shall be allowed to operate after 15.05.2019, if they have not implemented the provisions of BMW Rules with reference to Bar Code System. Considering the demand of IMA, the Chairman directed that the issues regarding the uniformity of rates charged by service providers of Bar Coding System be sorted out with the software service providers by IMA and CBWTF involving with HSPCB immediately.

**Agenda Item No. 5: Status of Compliance of directions of Hon'ble NGT in OA No. 606/2018.**

The Committee was apprised of the commitment given by Chief Secretary of Haryana in NGT on 06.03.2019, in OA No. 606/2018 in the matter of 'Compliance of Solid Waste Management Rules 2016', wherein the State of Haryana agreed to ensure 100% of the compliance of waste management rules, including Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016, in selected Cities/Towns/Panchayats of the State in a period of six months and Chief Secretary shall send an interim report regarding compliance of the same by 30.06.2019. The details of all the Cities/Towns/Panchayats notified by Urban Local Bodies (ULB) and Development & Panchayats Departments were shared with all the members. Chairman directed that the compliance be reviewed by all concerned and status report be sent to him every month.

The meeting ended with thanks to all the participants.

**Minutes of Meeting of the Committee constituted by State Level Advisory**  
**Committee held at 1100 Hrs on 02.04.2019.**

The Meeting of the Committee constituted by State Level Advisory Committee to recommend the uniform rates for treatment of Bio Medical Waste (BMW) by Common Bio Medical Waste Treatment Facilities (CBWTFs) from different categories of Health Care Facilities (HCF) was held under the Chairmanship of Shri. S. Narayan, IFS, Member Secretary, HSPCB at 1100 Hrs on 02.04.2019 at Conference Room of HSPCB, Sector-6, Panchkula, with the Members and co-opted members of the Committee. The list of participants is enclosed at **Annexure-A**.

Chairman welcomed all the participants and briefly explained the objective of the meeting i.e., finalization of the recommendations on rates for treatment of BMW for different categories of HCFs by CBWTFs as directed by the State Level Advisory Committee in its third meeting held on 26.03.2019. Rates earlier recommended to SLAC were again briefly informed to all participants along with the justifications for the same. The representation given by CBWTF Association, (**Annexure B**) along with the proposal for enhancement of the earlier proposal, justifying the reasons, was circulated to all members. Thereafter, the house was opened for discussion. A brief summary of the representation given by CBWTF Association has been given below.

The Committee, after detailed discussion and after considering the proposed rates of CBWTFs, objections of DGHS and IMA, rates of bags, transportation cost and distances of PHCs and CHCs from District HQ, recommends the following rates for the consideration of SLAC.

### Recommendations

A detailed discussion was held on the rates proposed by the committee and proposal submitted by the CBWTF association and it was agreed that the stand alone labs and diagnostic centres shall be treated in higher category of HCFs than clinics and their rates can be enhanced as proposed by CBWTFs. It was further agreed that the slab of facilities can be reduced after 50 beds and the 'above 50 beds' category can be considered on per bed basis. It was also agreed to include the category of Veterinary Hospitals as proposed. The rates proposed by CBWTFs have been examined and appropriate enhancement in almost every category was accepted considering the cost of plastic bags and transportation factors.

Sub: Representation for revision of rates for utilization of services of CBWTF's.

Sir,

This is in reference to the revision of rates for the utilization of service charges from the Health Care Facilities in the State of Haryana. The report prepared by the Sub Committee (Constituted by SLAC in its 2<sup>nd</sup> Meeting) was placed before us for the first time in the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting of SLAC held on 26.03.2019. Before representing the proposal for the rates on behalf of all the CBWTF's operating in Haryana and our stand on the redistribution of area amongst CBWTF, we would like to place certain facts regarding the meetings that were held for preparation of the proposal for the fixation of rates to be charged by the CBWTF's from the HCF

### FACTS

A. The Sub committee which was constituted earlier, i.e after the first meeting of SLAC vide letter dated 24.08.2018 prepared a report for the fixation of rates. We would like to bring this to your kind notice that in this committee, no representative from the CBWTF Association of Haryana was considered and report so prepared did not have any views/suggestions/proposal on behalf of CBWTF's Association. The main task assigned to this committee was of fixation of rates after considering all the factors that are related to bio medical waste management services in the State of Haryana. Unfortunately, the key stakeholders i.e CBWTF's were not made part of the committee.

B. The second sub-committee under the Chairmanship of Member Secretary, HSPCB, was constituted by SLAC in its 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting dated 07.03.2019, in which representatives of the CBWTF Association were made members of the Sub-committee. The report of the committee in clause (a) mentions that the committee held a series of meeting and examined facts provided by the previous committee. Here we would like to bring to your kind notice that being member of the committee we were never called for any meeting and were not discussed any aspect of the previous report. We were called only once for the sub-committee meeting on 20.03.2019, in which the matter of rates was discussed. In the meeting we were told that the committee is also looking of

We would like to submit that the rates for municipal waste disposal in Municipal Corporation of Gurgaon for an instance, charged by a authorized service provider is Rs. 1500/- per month for small. Clinics/shops/nursing homes. As compared to municipal waste, bio medical waste is infectious and hazardous in nature, so the handling and disposal of bio medical waste requires scientific and capital intensive technology. Therefore, the charges for collection, transportation, treatment and disposal of bio medical should be much higher then the disposal charges of general waste. As per WHO the average BMW generation in India is 277 gms/bed/day and has also stated that the level of segregation is far below satisfactory. Therefore, in order to achieve the goal of proper segregation, average quantity of Biomedical waste generated per bed per day should be 250 gms. Absence of BMW limit may lead to enormous waste generation due to leniency in segregation of waste. All the Health Care Units are handing over municipal waste with Bio-medical waste to the service provider in the absence of waste limit. On the basis of "Polluters Pay Principal", all the occupiers have to pay for the waste generated by their units. Different studies supporting the importance of segregation of bio medical waste and the waste limit criteria is attached as Annexure-A (I to VII)</p> <p>2. The charges approved by the Punjab State pollution control Board were fixed in 2014 @ Rs.5.40 per bed per day with an annual increase of 7% per annum (7.60/- per bed per day in 2019). As everyone is aware that with the revision in BMW Rules in 2016, all the CBWTF's were been directed to upgrade their plant and machinery in order to achieve revised emission standards. To comply with the direction all the CBWTF's in Haryana has already upgraded their facilities and has invested huge amount in the up gradation. Therefore, The rates of Rs.10/- per bed per day are the minimum possible rates to maintain quality services of bio medical waste management. The service charges proposed in the report are unrealistic and coerce the goal of achieving high standards and best quality in Bio Medical Waste Management, treatment and disposal. All agencies involved in bio medical waste management be it HSPCB, DGHS, IMA and other local bodies talk about technology and standards adopted by developed countries but no one wants to understand the importance and economic feasibility of such projects. The biggest irony in India is that - "the dirtiest jobs are least paid" making Modi ji's vision of Swatch Bharat difficult to achieve.</p>
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
